For some years we have urged WCC to produce a local list of heritage assets (City of Winchester Trust's 2018 A Vision for Winchester - Vision 9. A local list of buildings of architectural and/or historic merit is compiled). However, so far this has not happened. The existing Local Plan acknowledges in Policy DM31 in LPP2 that a list could be prepared in the future, and the Trust would like to see similar wording included as part of this policy as it keeps the aspiration of a local list alive. A list would raise the visibility of such buildings and so give a greater level of protection to significant unlisted buildings outside conservation areas which might otherwise be lost as has happened recently in Winchester.
