The SRN is a critical national asset and as such National Highways works to ensure that it operates and is managed in the public interest, both in respect of current activities and needs as well as in providing effective stewardship of its long-term operation and integrity. We will therefore be concerned with proposals that have the potential to impact the safe and efficient operation of the SRN, in this case the M3 between junctions 8 and 12, the A34 from the interchange with the A303 to Junction 9 of the M3 and a short section of the M27, including junction 8. Overall, in accordance with national policy, we look to Winchester City Council to promote strategies, policies and land allocations that will support alternatives to the car and the operation of a safe and reliable transport network. We welcome the Council's Objective to deliver inclusive communities with a range of services and infrastructure in sustainable neighbourhoods and measures which encourage sustainable and active transport and minimise the need to use the private car to travel. We would be concerned if any material increase in traffic were to occur on the SRN or at its junctions because of planned growth within the borough, without careful consideration of mitigation measures. NH are supportive of the Winchester District Regulation 18 Consultation Plan vision and objectives to deliver sustainable neighbourhoods with measures which encourage sustainable and active transport and minimise the need to use the private car to travel, which the Policies as outlined in the document should significantly contribute. We have provided feedback where necessary on the respective Policies considered to have potential impact on the SRN and note at this stage the Local Plan does not provide details or understanding of the impact to capacity at the local road network level. The SRN needs to be added to this requirement as well as a need to assess capacity when required. To ensure that the Local Plan is deliverable, a transport evidence base should be provided to demonstrate the Local Plan impact on the SRN and as necessary identify suitable mitigation. This work will form a key piece of evidence to demonstrate the Local Plan is sound, therefore it is important that any identified mitigation has a reasonable prospect of delivery within the timescales of when the identified growth is planned. Once the transport impacts of the Local Plan sites are understood, the Infrastructure Delivery Plan document should set out any SRN mitigation required to deliver the Local Plan development. We would welcome the opportunity to discuss this with Winchester District Council ahead of the next Local Plan consultation.

development that would exceed a height of 50m above ground
level. Both tall (of or exceeding a height of 50m above ground level)
structures and wind turbine development introduce physical
obstacles to low flying aircraft. Solar PV development can
compromise the operation of communications and other technical
assets by introducing substantial areas of metal that degrade
signals and, depending on the location of development, may
produce glint and glare to the detriment of aviation safety. Wind
turbines may impact on the operation of surveillance systems such
as radar where the rotating motion of their blades can degrade and
cause interference to the effective operation of these types of
installations, potentially resulting in detriment to aviation safety and
operational capability. This potential is recognised in the
Government's online Planning Practice Guidance which contains,
within the Renewable and Low Carbon Energy section, specific
guidance that both developers and Local Planning Authorities
should consult the MOD where a proposed turbine has a tip height
of, or exceeding 11m, and/or has a rotor diameter of 2m or more.

#### Vision

Development proposals should demonstrate **that** they contribute towards, and are compatible with, the overall aims of the Plan as set out in the vision and deliver the aspiration for each sub-area.

#### **Objectives**

Development proposals should demonstrate how they contribute towards the objectives of the Plan.

#### Amendments to supporting text

Insertion of new paragraph to follow 2.18 -

2.18 The city council has worked positively and collaboratively with neighbouring local planning authorities and other bodies to identify and seek to address any strategic, cross-boundary matters. How the council has engaged with neighbouring bodies and other bodies will be set out in Statement of Common Grounds which will be published on the WCC website before the Regulation 19 stage.

The Council has a particular responsibility with regards to the South Downs National Park Authority, to address both the potential impact of development within the Winchester Plan area upon the National Park, but also to consider how the development needs of that part of Winchester district which falls within the Park may be accommodated.

### 2.19

The council and a number of neighbouring authorities are members of the Partnership for South Hampshire (PfSH) which seeks to encourage sustainable, economic led growth and regeneration of the South Hampshire sub-region. Whilst this work is non-statutory

(i.e. not part of the formal development plan) it has helped to inform decision making for the development of the Regulation 18 Local\_Plan and helps to fulfil the council's duty to cooperate. Members of PfSH hasve entered into a Joint published a Spatial Position Statement which sets out a strategic development strategy for the area, including how shortfalls in housing provision in some authorities might be dealt with. There are currently a number of work streams currently in preparation, including an analysis of Strategic Development Opportunity Areas (SDOAs) to meet the PfSH unmet housing need, a Transport Assessment of potential SDOAs, and an economic analysis. Further details on the PfSH Spatial Position Statement haves been included in the Homes for All topic.

Amend the second sentence of paragraph 3.2 as follows -

The e<u>C</u>ouncil declared a climate emergency in 2019 and a nature emergency in 2023, work has taken place at a local level on a Winchester Town Vision, and local communities have commenced work on a number of neighbourhood development plans in Denmead, New Alresford, and Hursley along with new and updated village design statements.

Insert the following after the first sentence of the first paragraph of the Winchester Vision on page 21 as follows -

Winchester District has unique natural, cultural and historic assets which means it is an attractive place to live work and visit. **The need to adapt to, improve resilience to and mitigate climate change is being responded to.** The challenges of changes to the environment, economy and lifestyles will be met in a positive manner. The natural beauty, biodiversity and cultural heritage will be enhanced. Key assets such as chalk streams and the setting of the national park will be protected.

Amend the second sentence of the second paragraph of the vision on page 21 as follows -

New development will address the needs of the area and enhance the sustainability of communities, natural environment and the economy and respond to the wider relationship with neighbouring areas. Amend final sentence of the second paragraph of the Vision on page 21 as follows -

"We are also promoting tThe concept of 15 20 minute neighbourhoods and active travel is ensuring that development is connected to public transport, rights of way and cycleways"

Amend final sentence of the first bullet point of the Vision on page 21 as follows -

Regeneration will make the best use of previously developed land, which will be delivered while protecting and enhancing the character and the wealth of **heritage** historic assets.

Amend Objectives on page 22 as follows -

ii. Maximise the use of land as a **valuable** resource which is needed to accommodate growth through the promotion and prioritisation by prioritising the development of brownfield land, making best and most efficient use of available land which is suitable for development, and achieve high quality design which makes a positive contribution to the public realm

iii. Maintain **Conserve** and enhance Winchester District's valuable environments including both the urban and rural areas as well as the built, **historic**, and natural environments and improve wildlife assets through the Biodiversity Action Plan.

iv. Ensure that development is designed to provide biodiversity net gain, and does not have an adverse impact on landscape character and **the** historic environment and the unique and special characteristics of the South Downs National Park.
